


Intersexual Selection: Preferential Mate Choice

- Mixed mating strategies


Locations of 37 Cultures in International Mate Selection Project: Total # of People = 10,047

Ideal Number of Sex Partners Desired





Figure 4. Number of sexual partners desired. (Subjects recorded in blank spaces provided how many sexual partners they would ideally like to have for each specified time interval.)











Standards of Beauty are Consistent Across Cultures

Men's Age Preference as They Get Older







Time elapsed before seeking intercourse



 Function to influence other sex to be closer to actor's optimum


Male-Initiated Deception




Female Resistance Adaptations

Emotional Upset About Deception: Pre- and Post-Copulation




Upset Over Sexual Deception




Sexual Regret About Errors of Sexual Commission





Conclusions

Sexual conflict pervades all aspects of mating: Before, During, and After

Sexually Antagonistic Co-evolution

 For every sexual conflict adaptation in one sex, there exists at least one co-evolved defense in the other sex

Triadic Antagonistic Co-evolution

 For every triadic zone of sexual conflict, there exist adaptations to manipulate both other players to be closer to actor's optimum

A modern gazelle carries with it 'knowledge' of its ancestral predators.



Women Living Today Carry With Them

- Knowledge of their ancestral mating environments
- Knowledge of sexual deception, stealth, persistence, and coercion perpetrated by ancestral men
- Memory of the sexual conflict problems of their ancestral mothers
- And the inherited wisdom to solve them, at least sometimes, in the never-ending co-evolutionary sexual arms race.
